When released from hospital

When released after a hospital stay, some people are not well enough to travel by private vehicle or commercial transport.

If we feel you need medical care and need to travel by BC Ambulance, you will be charged \$80.00. They waive the fee if you receive income or disability assistance, or if you are a client of Veterans Affairs or Indigenous Services Canada.

If we feel you do not need medical care but are not well enough to travel with family or friends or by transit or taxi, we could suggest you travel by private ambulance.

The only time you do not pay for transport is when we need to move you between hospitals for medical care. We might arrange for an ambulance or a private company to transfer you, but you do not pay for this.

There are options for transport:

- when released from the hospital
- when needing to get to medical appointments once home

There might be a cost.









Companies offering transport in the Lower Mainland

Family and friends are often the best people to get a ride home when someone is released from hospital. They are also the best people to help you travel to and from appointments. However, sometimes they are not available.

Sometimes a person needs a little extra help. We describe options here for those who need extra help.

If you are well enough to travel with family or friends or by commercial transport (bus, taxi, ferry, plane, or private ambulance), you need to organize and pay for your travel.



Some private insurance plans might pay for some or all of the fees, such as Pacific Blue Cross, WorkSafeBC, or ICBC. Check with your insurer.

Handy Dart

HandyDART is a door-to-door shared-ride service. Vehicles are equipped to carry people with disabilities who need help using public transit.

SN Transport

SN Transport is a private ambulance company that transports people who are medically stable but need various types of special help such as:

- People who can walk but need help.
- People who use a wheelchair.
- People who need a stretcher.

Service hours Monday to Sunday
Earliest pick up 6:00 a.m.
Last pick up 11:00 p.m.

For times outside these hours, they need advance notice.

Fees (one way)

- \$160 and up for stretcher transfers
- \$45 and up for the semi-mobile (using cane, walker, or wheelchair)

Fees are added for distance travelled.
