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
The Safe Disposal of Sharps at Home

SHARPS ARE:

Needles, syringes with attached needles and disposable lancets.







Do not put sharps loose into household garbage.



- A loose needle or sharp object inside a trash can injure family members, the waste collectors or fall into the hands of children or other people.
- Don't break, bend, clip or recapused needles.
- Don't place sharp items in any containers that are recyclable or thin-walled e.g. aluminum cans, glass jars, plastic pop bottles, milk jugs or cartons.

- Don't place containers full of sharps in recycling bins.
 - Don't flush sharps down the toilet.
 - The best solution is to use a sharps disposal system from a pharmacy.

SAFE PRACTICES:

- Most pharmacies have special containers, which are designed to hold needles, syringes, lancets or any other sharp item.
- Check with your pharmacy to see if they offer safe disposal of used sharps.
- If you are unable to use a proper container for sharps, place sharp items in a thick plastic or metal container with a screw on lid e.g. bleach, fabric softener jug, or motor oil container.
- When container is ¾ full, add one tablespoon of bleach and 2 tablespoons of water to it, secure lid with strong tape (e. g. duct tape) and shake container gently.
- Clearly mark the container "sharpsdispose of properly".
- Place sealed container in regular garbage.
